Themes: Self-Confidence, Hispanic Heritage

Book Brief: When a young girl feels ashamed of her family for being "different" and subconsciously blames her abuela, she gradually grows to not only accept but also love the yellow handkerchief that represents a language and culture that once brought embarrassment.

BEFORE READING

The Cover: Have students make predictions about the story based on the cover.

The Pictures: Take a brief picture walk and ask students what they notice about the yellow handkerchief.

Prior Knowledge: Ask students, "Do you have an item that is special to you or your family? What is it?" (Optional: think, pair, share)

Vocabulary: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying Vocabulary Guide.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read today, watch what happens to the yellow handkerchief."

DURING READING

Check for understanding & make connections:

- · Why doesn't the girl like her grandma's handkerchief?
- Why does Abuela go live with her sister?
- How does the handkerchief change the girl?

AFTER READING

Our Purpose: The yellow handkerchief was left behind by abuela. How does the girl feel about the handkerchief in the end?

Extending Our Thinking: The yellow handkerchief is an important symbol in the girl's family and heritage. Using <u>RIF's Titles</u> <u>Can Be Telling</u>, have students go back through the book and make connections in the book to the title.

If your students enjoyed this book...

- · Encourage them to continue to discuss it and refer to it in other lessons and conversations.
- Let them explore more about the topic by reading other books with similar themes, structure, characters, or content.
