Book Brief: Ellen, raised in an immigrant family and originally aspiring to be a professional flutist, found her passion for engineering in college despite being told it wasn't for girls. She persevered and ultimately became a NASA astronaut, breaking barriers and achieving great success.

### **BEFORE READING**

The Cover: Have students make predictions about the story based on the cover.

The Pictures: Take a brief picture walk and ask students what they notice about Dr. Ellen Ochoa.

Prior Knowledge: Ask students, "Have you ever wanted to do something but someone told you no? What did you do?" (Optional: think, pair, share)

Vocabulary: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying Vocabulary Guide.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read today, listen for how Ellen becomes an astronaut, the challenges she faces, and how she overcomes them."

### **DURING READING**

Check for understanding & make connections:

- What did Ellen's father teach her? Why?
- · What inspired Ellen to become an astronaut?
- · How did Ellen become an astronaut?

### AFTER READING

Our Purpose: Dr. Ellen Ochoa became the first Latina in space. Explain her troubles and how she overcame them.

Extending Our Thinking: Dr. Ellen Ochoa demonstrated remarkable perseverance in becoming an astronaut. Using <u>RIF's Main</u> <u>Idea and Key Details Graphic Organizer</u>, have students identify the main idea and supporting details that illustrate Dr. Ochoa's perseverance.

- Encourage them to continue to discuss it and refer to it in other lessons and conversations.
- · Let them explore more about the topic by reading other books with similar themes, structure, characters, or content.
