READ ALOUD GUIDE


Themes: Diversity, Family, Overcoming Fears, Thanksgiving

Book Brief: Peyton is particular about food, preferring her dishes to remain separate and avoiding certain colors and textures, but she enjoys a variety of activities and trying new things. Unlike being picky, which is seen as negative, Peyton embraces her interests, such as mastering long division and playing the saxophone.

BEFORE READING

The Cover: Have students make predictions about the story based on the cover.

The Pictures: Take a brief picture walk and ask students what they notice about Peyton.

Prior Knowledge: Ask students, "Do you have something you want to try but you are too afraid or scared? What is it?" (Optional: think, pair, share)

Vocabulary: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying Vocabulary Guide.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read today, pay attention to how Peyton overcomes her fears."

DURING READING

Check for understanding & make connections:

- Describe Peyton. What characteristics would you use?
- What is Peyton's problem?
- How do you think Peton feels? Why do you think that?
- · What is different about this Thanksgiving?
- How does Aunt Polly help solve Peyton's problem?

AFTER READING

Our Purpose: Aunt Polly helps Peyton learn a lesson. What did she teach Peyton?

Extending Our Thinking: Peyton is particular and wants this Thanksgiving to be different. Use RIF's <u>What's Your Problem</u>, have students fill out the organizer to deepen their understanding of Peyton's problem and how it was solved.

- · Encourage them to continue to discuss it and refer to it in other lessons and conversations.
- Let them explore more about the topic by reading other books with similar themes, structure, characters, or content.
