In the Philippines, Valentine's Day is about love. The government has a big wedding where many couples get married at the same time.



In Japan, Valentine's Day means chocolate! There is special chocolate called honmei choco for people you love. Giri choco is for friends and family.

In South Africa, Valentine's Day is on February 15th. This is to remember an old Roman festival. Women write the name of the person they love on a paper and pin it to their arm. They are wearing their hearts on their sleeves!

In Italy, they celebrate Valentine's Day in a big way. In Verona, the home of Romeo and Juliet, there are parties for four days. People enjoy music, heart-shaped lanterns, and contests to write love letters.

In South Korea, Valentine's Day is a special day for men. Women give them gifts and chocolates. A month later, on White Day, women receive gifts. In April, on Black Day, single people eat noodles with black bean sauce.
