As teachers and parents, we are eager to share with children stories that celebrate human sweetness, help us find common ground, and honor what makes each of us unique.

Alice Walker has laid a path for exploring a joyous view of the world.

Use this activity guide to celebrate the big ideas shared in Sweet People Are Everywhere with children in school or at home:

- Learn about different countries and the sweet people who live there;
- Notice how much people around the world have in common;
- Examine how the book's illustrations and writing give us a peek into peoples' lives; and
- Think about how storytelling connects people.

Draw children into the book through their senses and curiosity. Depending on the students' ages, you might:



READ TOGETHER

• Invite children to imagine themselves in the pictures. For each illustration use Crayola's **SEEK™** Insights tool to read art. Ask, "What do you **See?**" "What makes you say that? What is the **Evidence**?" "Can you **Explain** what you think the artist and author want to tell us?" "What do you **Know**? What do you want to know?"

CREATE and PRESENT

- Have children imagine several places they would like to visit. Have them research, illustrate, and write about these special places, then share their ideas with one another.
- Stories can be told through poems, letters, personal narratives, or mysteries that unfold. Ask children to write a poem, or a text in another genre of their choice, about the special place they imagine visiting.
- Create a hand-drawn book that includes images and words that are important to people you know and want to learn more about. Ask children how they could learn more about the families in your community. How could this hand-drawn book celebrate the countries where community members are from, their favorite music, games, and food?
- Put on a show! Ask children to dramatize the **Sweet People Are Everywhere** story through puppet play, creative movement, or a mini-theater presentation.

RESPOND and CONNECT

- This guide is designed to encourage children's independence and imaginative thought. Use the activities to learn what children are thinking and discover what fascinates them.
- There are great similarities in what humans around the world celebrate as major life events and annual festivals. What celebrations will children study to find and honor these commonalities and rich cultural differences? Teachers, how can you connect these ideas with your curriculum goals?


ADAPTATIONS

- For younger children: Celebrate small acts of everyday kindness and the richness of learning about others—our similarities and our differences.
- For older children: Identify uplifting examples of humankind's common thread of kindness. Develop a plan for helping people in and around your school cultivate an open, welcoming, and curious atmosphere. 

Listen and move to music from different countries.


Draw lines, shapes, swirls, and patterns as you hear the instruments, voices, or rhythms.


